# LEARNING TO BE GRATEFUL

A lady in my home group started a group gratitude text. Each morning, someone will send a text to the group describing what they are grateful for that day. Then someone else will respond with what they are grateful for and so on. Usually it is something like being grateful for getting to sleep in or for having a clean house. This may sound a little trivial, but I think that is the whole point. God may not have chosen to give us much today, but there is always something to be grateful for – if we look for it.

As alcoholics, some of us may have lost the ability to be grateful. Think back to when you were a kid at Christmas. I grew up poor, but we always had a Christmas tree, and there was always at least one gift under the tree for me. I was up at dawn and champing at the bit, pestering my parents until I could go tear into that present and find out what Santa had brought me. I was so happy and so excited! And I was grateful in a way that only a child can be, without analyzing it or wondering why I should be grateful. Most of us fortunate enough to be born in this country can remember similar Christmas excitement and childlike gratitude. Somewhere along the way, many of us lost that.

"This may sound funny but I'm grateful to be grateful. For a time, I was a victim. Whatever happened to me was not my fault. If I didn't get something I wanted, I'd been ripped off. If I got something I wanted, I deserved it, and it was my right, so I didn't need to be grateful for what was mine.

Through the grace of God and this program, I am more right sized today. I understand that, if something goes wrong, I usually have some part in it. If something goes right, I've learned to be grateful for the gifts I receive. Thank you, God, for allowing me to learn this."

These thoughts just popped into my head, all at once. I firmly believe that it was my higher power at work. I can't take the credit. God had a plan, and I just wrote it down. I hope that you find some meaning in this and that you've learned to be grateful again, too.

**Q. Dear Alkie:** I have good times when I drink. Didn't you?

Alkie: Drinking was a hell of a good time until the good times disappeared; then it was just hell.

**Q.** Dear Alkie: How can I hang with my friends if I'm not drinking? What did you do?

Alkie: When I was drinking, I wanted to fit in and stand out at the same time. I didn't really want friends; I wanted a fan club!

**Q.** Dear Alkie: I've heard that there are a lot of famous alcoholics. What were they famous for?

Alkie: Alcoholics are famous for two things--self employment and one car accidents!

Even after all these years in AA and coming to a wonderful and comfortable concept of an HP of my understanding, it still jolts me when I read some of the passages from the Big Book which reflect the language of the bible. It brings back the



feelings of resistance I felt when I first came in. Still, I stayed, putting my faith in the entire AA program, the AA's who had time and my sponsor who thought of herself as a recovering Catholic as well as a recovering alcoholic.

I learned to substitute my own words for those in the AA literature that I found too religious,

and it worked. I was able to get the concepts and not get stuck in my resistance. The main concept for me is that it is not my will. I don't have to know if it is his, hers, theirs or an energy, just not mine. And when I let go and I don't pursue my will, something wonderful prevails, and I experience the freedom the Big Book talks about. I am so grateful.
